## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT - PATRICIA KOUTEN

Dear Members,

With our annual meeting on the horizon, I find myself both sad and happy as my tenure as President comes to an end. I am very proud to serve in this role and to work with a state board that has grown stronger each year. Your state board consists of 31 leaders, all of whom attend and participate in the board meeting process. In reflection of our accomplishments; we have revamped our meetings, our minutes, rejuvenated our nominations and elections process, rededicated ourselves to strict budgeting procedures, increased state conference scholarships to members, provided local affiliate stimulus grants, increased funding to local affiliates, revised our Bylaws, and have made a renewed commitment to serving our members and to fulfilling the mission of NJAEYC. We are honored to work with *Professional Impact New Jersey* (PINJ) to provide a collaborative scholarship with the backing of the former *New Jersey Statewide Coalition for Child Care*. Additionally, we look forward to continuing our collaborative efforts as we work with PINJ and NJ Association of Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies (NJACCRRRA) to provide scholarships for the *new* New Jersey Administrator Credential.

During this past year, your board took a hard look at the Board Member Job Description and our *Statement of Commitment*. All board members have renewed their commitment to NJAEYC by signing off on this commitment statement and understanding the dedication needed to serve our members and the mission of NJAEYC. The executive board has made a commitment to its Governing Board as well by providing more training to the board in their fiduciary role as board members and as advocates for young children.

We renewed our commitment to advocacy this past year. At our summer retreat, Lorraine Cooke, Vice President of Public Policy led us in a discussion on all of the public policy issues surrounding young children and families locally, statewide and nationally. This data is being used to develop our NJAEYC Public Policy agenda as required by NAEYC. In October, in a preconference training, Dr. Cooke led us in a session on how to use our firsthand experience to reach out

to legislators, newspapers, and anyone who needs to hear from us. Many of us came back with completed homework showing the results of our advocacy efforts, which included letters to the editor, letters and calls to legislators, Governor Christie, NJ Department of Education and more.

NJAEYC would like to recognize and thank Mark Ginsberg, Ph.D for his work as Executive Director of NAEYC the past 12 years, as he plans to move on in June, as Dean of The College of Education and Human Development at George Mason University. We welcome Jerlean Daniel, Ph.D, current Deputy Executive Director, who will take over in June 2010 when Dr. Ginsberg leaves. Dr. Daniel comes to us with many years of dedicated service and as a distinguished elected past president of NAEYC.

I look forward to my new role beginning in June as past president and plan to continue working toward the vision, mission and goals of NJAEYC. I congratulate and look forward to the exciting things to come as we are led by Lisa Lockwood who will take over as President after the annual meeting on May 20, 2010.

I thank you for your commitment to young children and their families and look forward to continuing our work together for our educators and the families and children we serve. I urge you to accept the call of giving of your talents to serve on your local or state board, either as a committee member or as a board member. We followed it up with a hands-on night targeting college and high school early childhood students as they were invited to join our members in a Story Telling workshop and a Puppet making workshop. We had over a dozen college students attend and several joined. We had a very successful night featuring “Making the Most of Conversation” by our own Beth Rosenkowitz who was named the Teacher of the Year and winner of the Lakeshore award at the state conference, as well as a speech pathologist and an infant toddler workshop. ## UPDATE ON PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The 2009 State Conference in Atlantic City was well attended despite the poor economy and competition with the NAEYC annual conference in Washington, D.C. which many of our regular attendees took advantage of attending.

Frank Leto and Luis Hernandez, our keynotes speakers, really motivated the crowd and the closing session by Holly Ellisa Bruno left those who attended the closing session feeling positive and upbeat. Comments were highly favorable for the majority of the 93 workshops offered.

We received some very good suggestions from the surveys which were returned at the end of the conference such as:

- Remind people what to do with their stickers.
- Place surveys in the tote bags, instead of attached in the booklet.
- Have ribbons at the registration desk.
- Change the raffle time.

One question that occurs each year is why we do not provide coffee and tea throughout the day and the answer is as simple as dollars and cents. It is just too cost prohibitive to do so. We did arrange to have water coolers available at several locations outside of the workshop rooms in response to your request last year.

Another question has been raised regarding our Atlantic City venue. The conference is held there because it is one of the few locations that can meet our needs for a large keynote arena, the large number of breakout rooms for the wide variety of workshops, hospitalities, and nearby hotel accommodations, while keeping within our budget. We are committed to this location for the next two years and will explore alternate possibilities for the 2012 conference.

We have been successfully able to avoid any increase in registration fees for the **PAST 4 YEARS**, despite the yearly increases in expenses which we have absorbed, particularly in food costs. Last year, we introduced

50 new workshops to select from, in addition to the amenities that you have been accustomed to, including continental breakfast, lunch, free parking, and networking with your peers.

Since 2009 was a Gubernatorial election year, we thought that it would be a good idea to invite the candidates to speak at the conference to present their views on early childhood issues, since it is the largest gathering of early childhood professionals in the state. Regrettably, it inadvertently offended and upset many people. Clearly, that was not our intent. For the record, all three of the candidates were invited, but only two responded to attend. The times that the candidates presented were when they were available to attend. It was not the intent of NJAEYC and in fact, it is against our bylaws, to promote one candidate over another or to advocate for one political party over another.

Through future advocacy efforts, we will continue to keep our membership up-to-date on early childhood issues that affect our students and their families and on issues that affect us as early childhood professionals.

We would like to thank the many volunteers that helped to make the 2009 conference a success. Sharon Mouzone, new to our governing board, took on the task of organizing the student volunteers and was a tremendous help to us. A special thanks goes to Helen Muscato, who works for many months behind the scenes contacting vendors and presenters and takes care of so many details that it makes putting this conference together look easy.

While the conference committee is already busy at work preparing for the 2010 conference, we would welcome any suggestions that you might have to help enhance our conference.
